14	MONSIGNOR SULLIVAN: Almighty God, we call you by
15	different names, draw near, we pray in the season
16	that is sacred to many of us; for Christians during
17	this holy 40-day season of Lent; we pray, we fast, we
18	increase our charity to draw closer to your Holiness
19	and allow that Holiness to deepen in our lives; for
20	Muslims during this holy month of Ramadan, these very
21	same practices draw your people closer to you and to
22	one another; for Jews in about a month they will
23	gather for Sedar meals in the eight days of Passover
24	to mark a journey out of oppression. But as we raise
25	up these sacred seasons, we must confess to you our
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1 NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 11 2 creator, our sustainer, that we, your people, are not 3 always so holy, and the words and actions of our 4 lives betray what we mock, and sometimes we even use 5 them in a perverted way to spew hate and violence on those who call you by different names, worship you in 6 7 different ways, or wear different garb. We ask your 8 mercy, and ask that you help us to amend our ways. 9 And Almighty God, we admit our failings, but please permit me, with more than a little trepidation and 10 11 ready to dodge lightning bolts, to raise up some of 12 your failings. Are you not a God of Peace; where are 13 in Gaza and Israel? Are you not a God that protects your children; where are you in Haiti and Miramar? 14 15 Are you not a god of solidarity; where are you in the 16 Sudan and Senegal? Are you not a god of just order; 17 what about Venezuela and Nicaragua? Are you not a god 18 who cares for human rights; where are you in Russia 19 and China? And are you not a God that protects your 20 children when attacked; where are you in the Ukraine? 21 So, God please not count me too brash for having 2.2 overstepped; I'd go on, but I think you get the 23 point. But now, Almighty God, allow me to draw you closer to home, where we need your presence and help, 24 because even with our strong efforts, the powers of 25

So, please protect our city, 3 those who ride our subways; who deliver our food, on 4 God, yes, please, a personal prayer of forgiveness 5 for me, because I do cuss those on motorbikes when they almost run me over going the wrong way on the 6 7 streets. I'm sorry. So, help our teachers to teach better; our students to learn better. Help those who 8 9 struggle to pay their rent. And in these holy seasons, when many voluntarily fast, help those, 10 11 especially your children, who involuntarily fast. We 12 call that hunger, because they do not have enough 13 food to eat; help those who serve them with the 14 resources needed to feed our hungry neighbors. And, 15 Almighty God, while material things are essential to 16 preserving and enhancing human dignity, so too are 17 the spiritual ones that go to the core of our 18 humanity, Almighty God, reduce our hate and anger at 19 one another, especially when rooted in religious, 20 ethnic, or class differences. Rid us of anti-21 Semitism; mazeophobia; xenophobia, nimbyism, and 2.2 every other phobia and ism from our words, actions 23 and hearts. May our protests be passionate and respectful; our (INAUDIBLE), even when intense, be 24 civil. You know, Almighty God, maybe my prayer is 25

1 NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 13 2 just too dark and negative, so let me not forget to 3 say, thank you, for all the good things you bestowed 4 upon us in this great city; thank you that we have 5 welcomed almost 2,000 newcomers these past two years; and 100,000 of them are now making it in our city; 6 7 and we thank you that 34,000 children are being educated in our schools, and that many have access to 8 9 health care. We thank you that our city and nonprofit workers are moving towards fairer wages, reflected of 10 11 the hard and dedicated work they do for all of us. 12 And we thank you in a very basic way that millions 13 and millions of the city are working every day caring 14 for their families, using our parks, riding safely 15 our buses and subways; preparing meals for their 16 apartments; and talking to their neighbors. O' mighty God, I've rambled on too long, and you're busy, and 17 18 the members of this Council are now turning back to 19 their screens of their devices; so let me end by 20 saying, thank you for the dedication of the members 21 of this council, and ask you your blessing upon them 2.2 and the people of this great city. Protect them, 23 guide them in integrity for the sake of us all, and let all of us say, amen. 24

The hearings continue, and I want to thank 10 11 all of you for your continued leadership in these hearings as well as our Finance Division staff for 12 their very hard work. I thank members of the public 13 14 for adding their voices to this important 15 conversation about the needs of our city.

I want to give a special shoutout to our 16 17 Education Chair, Rita Joseph, for her marathon 18 hearing yesterday. (APPLAUSE) From 10:00 a.m. to 19 approximately 11 p.m., you all, the voices of 20 educational professionals, advocates, and most importantly, the children were heard in this chamber, 21 and I thank our Education Chair for her dedication 2.2 23 and commitment.

9	and, the creation of a community task force to

22	health and substance use disorders. A previous
23	version was launched in 2016 with the previous
24	Administration and trained more than 155,000 New
25	Yorkers - at its peak 25 City agencies were involved
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1 NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 38 and trainings were offered every day of the week in 2 3 multiple languages. Our Mental Health crisis has 4 become even more severe after this program was suspended in early 2020 because of the pandemic. 5 Four years have passed, but we have yet to see the 6 7 return of this training. Community based organizations that received this guidance years ago 8 9 talked about all sorts of cultural and organizational changes, they more proactively and frequently 10 11 corrected misperceptions about mental health; they developed their own training and created instructors 12 13 within their own organizations to provide culturally competent care to their communities. And then there 14 15 are the practical benefits, all the emergency room visits that have been averted, lives saved - 90% of 16 17 surveyed trainees use these skills in the past six 18 months, and on average they helped approximately four 19 individuals each. Based on all these self-reports, 20 about 6,000 people were assisted and guided by 21 trainees to more specialized help. I was a leader of a nonprofit that served the immigrant community, and 2.2 23 I'm a witness to this kind of program. I saw firsthand how it benefited community and religious 24 leaders, and our staff, who had the most face-to-face 25

1NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING392time with New Yorkers experiencing crisis. I hope3you'll join me in bringing this program back to4create a real kind of social emotional support, thank5you.

Resolution 282, designating March 24th annually 15 as Women of Color In Tech in the city of New York to 16 recognize their contributions, especially women of color to the technology industry and acknowledge 17 18 their challenges that they face; Resolution 280 19 designating November 30th annually as Shirley 20 Chisholm Day in the city of New York to recognize her contributions as an educator, activist, and elected 21 official who served the people of New York City with 2.2 23 passion and dignity; additionally, Introduction 691 a Local Law in relation to annual reporting on racial 24 and gender disparities in STEM education for high 25

1 NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING 40 2 school students; Resolution 281 calling on the 3 Mayor's Office to identify and implement measures to reduce disparities faced by businesses owned by women 4 5 of color in obtaining and fulfilling public contracts; and lastly Resolution 283 calling on the 6 7 MTA to train and provide non-law enforcement 8 personnel to work in the subway system to handle 9 issues with mentally ill customers. We acknowledge this month as honoring women like Shirley Chisholm, 10 11 an outspoken champion for economic justice and racial gender equity, yet for far too long women have faced 12 13 obstacles and barriers hindering their ability to 14 flourish in education, politics, and the municipal 15 workforce - and in business. According to the New 16 York City Comptroller's 2022 Report, only 29% of tech 17 workers were women, a much lower share than the rest 18 of the overall workforce. In addition, women 19 entrepreneurs in the tech industry are outnumbered 20 three to one by men, and women-founded companies still have fewer private funding opportunities. We 21 continue to witness gender disparities across various 2.2 23 sectors as women only comprise about 27% of the tech workforce, with women of color making up less than 24 5%. This mirrors the disparities girls face in STEM 25

Now more than ever, it is imperative that Haitians themselves take the lead in 6 7 shaping the future of our nation with a median age ... 8 can you imagine that 23 years old, they can work they 9 can do things. Haiti boasts on one of the youngest populations in the western hemisphere; therefore, a 10 11 meaningful solution to our challenges must actively 12 involve the perceptive and contribution of the youth 13 (sic). Nevertheless, we cannot overcome these 14 obstacles alone. I appeal to the international 15 community to come together to swiftly and provide 16 sincere... when I mean sincere... because Haiti has 17 a lot of natural resources - believe it or not, 18 because I spoke to an architect, engineer, people 19 that have been engaged... archaeologist and all.. Support much is needed from our brothers and sisters, 20 21 please don't stay silent, because, that's as my colleagues just mentioned, the first (TIMER CHIMES) 2.2 23 Black republic that actually talked about freedom. Together, let us pave the many brighter, more helpful 24 future of those Haitian people. We are a proud nation 25

7 COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: Thank you, Madam Chair. 8 I want to thank Speaker Adams, Majority Leader, 9 Chair Salamanca, Chair Hanks, and all my colleagues. Today we are doing my Brownsville Art Center and 10 11 Apartment application; we was we were able to 12 increase the number of apartments available to the 13 lowest income households those at 30% AMI and those 14 set aside for formerly homeless. The community asked 15 for larger apartments, we were able to get HPD to 16 commit to increasing the size of all the apartments, 17 including substantially increasing the size of the 18 living rooms in the apartments. It is important that 19 the community be able to have the space in the 20 building... to ask HPD to give the CBOs 20 hours per month free to the community. I want to thank HPD for 21 2.2 doing that.

And as the community knows, parking is a challenge in my district, and they have committed to releasing a Parking Study/Loading Study at the end of NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING
 the month. As a preliminary commitment, they have
 agreed to make ten new onsite overnight parking
 spaces available on East New York Avenue and on
 Dumont Avenue.

Finally, I am proud that this project celebrates 6 7 the talent of Brownsville Community by including space for the arts and culture organizations that are 8 9 the lifeblood of this community. I have no doubt that the Brownsville Art Center will generate 10 11 opportunities for so many of my community members and 12 the youth who are interested in art, dance, and 13 music. I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting 14 this project.
